GAINSBOROUGH TRANSPORT STRATEGY

## Lincolnshire

- 5500 miles of road / 4th largest network in UK
- £45M road maintenance
- 40,000 work orders per year
- £4M public transport: bus passes
- £35M school's transport: 25k children daily transported
- Major infrastructure:
  - North Hykeham Relief Rd £150M
  - Grantham southern relief road £160M



## Maintenance – 3 Year Summary

- LCC carriageway schemes total £4.16m
- Foxby Lane S278s £2m
- Pedestrian crossings £16.4k Morton Rd
- TROs: Church Street, Trinity Street, Park Springs, Corringham Rd
- Carriageway:
  - 1900 repairs
  - 14 Minor Works jobs
  - 301 kerb/channel
- Footway:
  - 296 footway defects made safe.
  - 33 patching/kerbing
  - 39 debris removal
- Vegetation:
  - 45 vg clearance
  - 72 tree works
- Drainage:
  - 24 drainage investigations/repairs
- Street Furniture repairs:
  - 41 repairs to bollards, signs, railings.



## **Maintenance - 12mth Plan**

- Carriageway estimated £2.4m Town spend
- A631 Corringham Village Scheme £1.4m
- Footways 49 sites for micro-surfacing this year
- Street Lighting £102k Whites Wood Lane



## **Public Transport - Rail**

#### **COVID Impact on Services:**

- Sheffield to Gainsborough Central Service suspended
- Lincoln to Sheffield/Leeds service frequency was

#### **Current Service Status:**

- Funded by Central Government, with challenges in regional service recovery.
- Additional services must be cost-neutral or have a business case for funding.
- Lincoln to Sheffield/Leeds service has resumed, but journey times have increased due to additional stops.
- Sheffield to Gainsborough Central partially resumed, then fully withdrawn;
   Brigg route operates on Saturdays only.

#### Services by Northern Trains:

- Lincoln to Leeds service operates 16/17 trains daily, with reduced frequency on Sundays.
- A new weekday service from May 2023 links Sheffield, Gainsborough Central, and Cleethorpes with no weekend service.

#### Services by East Midlands Trains:

 Doncaster to Lincoln via Gainsborough Lea Road operates 5 trains daily on weekdays and Saturdays.

#### Future Planning & Infrastructure:

- Network Rail published the Lincolnshire Strategic Advice for network planning.
- Ongoing stakeholder engagement for planning and business case development.
- Gainsborough Lea Road platform renewal is delayed, which is part of the Control Period 6 scheme.

#### Community Initiatives:

- Community rail partnership reactivates X90 Saturday bus service for the summer.
- Funding secured for 10 weeks of service from June 29, coinciding with Cleethorpes Armed Forces Day.





## **Public Transport - Bus**

#### S106 Funding Allocation (2021/22):

 Gainsborough was awarded £50k for bus stop and shelter enhancements.

#### **Bus Stop Improvements:**

- New marked bus stops on Corringham Road
- Upgrades to existing bus services on Corringham Road due to recently enhanced town service.

#### **Bus Shelter Upgrades:**

- Working with Gainsborough Town Council:
  - A new shelter on Beaumont Street.
  - Replacement shelters at Lea Road Station (2), Shakespeare Street, Gordon Street, and Church Street.

#### Service Frequency Increase:

- Gainsborough in-town bus service frequency increased fourfold, from 1 to 4 buses per hour.
- Expanded service coverage to new areas of the town, including Morrisons.


#### **Technology Integration:**

- Introduction of an app-based booking system for CallConnect, facilitating easy self-service access to bus services for residents.
- Real-Time information boards being rolled out across the network.





## **Gainsborough Transport Strategy**



**Goals**: To support economic growth, improve access to services, and assist in the transition to net zero emissions, making travel more sustainable and efficient.

### **Key Challenges**

- Increased housing
- Employment opportunities
- Pinch pints

### Strategic Objectives:

- Enhance the town centre to make it safer and more attractive.
- Improve facilities for walking and cycling.
- Investigate and possibly enhance key traffic junctions.
- Develop Gainsborough's train and bus stations into mobility hubs.

### **Proposed Solutions**

- Mobility hubs that provide a range of transport options.
- Improved streetscape and pedestrian access
- Improve connectivity: e.g. Bridge Rd / A631 corridor

Funding and Support: Limited and developer-led

## Night Light Cafe


## What is a Night Light Café?

A Night Light Cafe is a safe space for people to come, they can offer non clinical mental health support. All Night Light Cafes are run by trained volunteers who are there to listen mostly in the evening when community mental health teams are not readily available.

Knowing that you have been there for someone to help and support and listen to them is very rewarding.







## Aim of the programme's


- Work and Health programme has been in operation since 2018 with the emphasis on supporting unemployed individuals to overcome barriers to find sustainable employment.
- Pioneer is based on the concept of Place, Train and Maintain. This means we place
  people in work at the earliest opportunity, prepare them to be trained to do the job in
  the way the employer wants it done, and provide ongoing support to maintain them in
  the job.

## **Facts and Figures**

- In 2023 we supported 678 participants back into employment
- From January March 2024 we have supported 185 participants back into employment

  - 6 months sustainment support, includes ongoing support from a Business Mentor.
  - Loan and funding advice where applicable
  - Help with Registering with HMRC, e.g., obtaining UTR Number
  - Participants will be required to provide evidence of continued trading at various points throughout the 6 months

## **Eligibility & Referral Process**

- Must not be in any form of paid employment
- Must not have been on the programme before
- Must be in a position where they are ready to look for work in the next 12 months
- Have a disability/ health condition or be part of the Early Entry Criteria
- Must have access to government funds.



## **Early Access criteria groups**

- an ex-offender (someone who has completed a custodial sentence or a community sentence), or offender (someone who is serving a community sentence)
- a carer
- an ex-carer
- · a homeless person
- a former member of His Majesty's (HM) Armed Forces
- · a member of the HM Armed Forces reserves
- a partner of current or former Armed Forces personnel

- a person for whom a drug/alcohol dependency (including a history of) presents a significant barrier to employment
- a care leaver
- refugee
- young people identified as being involved or at risk of being involved in gangs or serious violence
- victims of domestic violence
- Afghan Resettlers
- Ukrainian Evacuees


Gainsborough Changing Places Campaign

In the UK more than 300,000 individuals require **Changing Places toilets** for their everyday care.

These specialised toilets go beyond standard accessibility, offering essential features like hoists, adult-sized changing benches, and extra space for carers.

However, the reality remains concerning: there are only 2299 changing places toilets nationwide. In some areas access to these vital facilities are none existent, posing significant challenges for individuals with disabilities and their care givers.

There are no registered Changing Places toilets Gainsborough or in West Lindsey.





## **Changing Places Toilets**

### What is a Changing Places Toilet?

- Changing Places Toilets are different from, and needed in addition to, standard accessible toilets because they meet the needs of different people.
- CPTs are essential for over 300,000 people in the UK.
- A CPT is more than an accessible toilet because it provides:
  - ➤ An adult-sized, height-adjustable changing bench
  - > A hoist (mobile or ceiling track)
  - > A peninsular toilet and washbasin
  - > A privacy screen
  - > More space; 12 metres squared

## Who are they for?

Thousands people with profound and multiple learning disabilities as well as other disabilities that severely limit mobility.

People may be limited in their mobility so need support from one or two carers to either get on to the toilet or have their continence pad changed.

Without Changing Places toilets, the person with disabilities is put at risk, and families are forced to risk their own health and safety by changing their loved one on a toilet floor..... or avoid going out at all.













## **Changing Places Toilets**

### Building Regulations – Statutory CPT Installation Requirements

Building Type	Capacity or area
Assembly, recreation and entertainment	350 persons or more
Ditto, but being within a collection of smaller buildings	2,000 persons or more
Example: zoos, theme parks, venues for sport & exhibitions	
Shopping centres/malls or retail parks	30,000 m2 gross floor area or more
Retail Premises	2,500 m2 gross floor area or more
Sport & Leisure	More than <b>5,000 m2</b> gross floor area
Hospitals & primary care centres	n/a
Crematoria and cemetery	n/a
